John Tucker completed his PhD at Columbia University (1990), with a specialization in Sino-Japanese Confucianism. Earlier, at the University of Hawaii, he studied East Asian philosophy and East Asian history, completing MAs in 1981 and 1983. As an undergraduate at Davidson College (1977), Tucker majored in history. He has done research work as a visiting fellow at Kyoto University's Institute for Research in the Humanities (1995, 2000), Nanzan University's Institute for Religion and Culture (2007), and National Taiwan University's Institute for Advanced Studies in the Humanities and Social Sciences (2010). Tucker is director of the ECU Asian Studies Program sponsored by the Thomas Harriot College of Arts and Sciences. He has also served as director of the Harriot College's Voyages of Discovery Lecture Series, since its founding in 2007. In 2008, Tucker was appointed to serve as the ECU University Historian.

Tucker has published two books: *Itō Jinsai's Gomō jiqi and the Philosophical Definition of Early-Modern Japan* (Brill, 1998), and *Ogyū Sorai's Philosophical Masterworks: The Bendō and Benmei* (University of Hawai'i Press, 2006). He is currently working on several projects: one tentatively entitled, *Confucianism and Skepticism*, and another, *Yamaga Sokō and the Invention of Bushidō*. He is co-editing, along with Professor Chun-chieh Huang of National Taiwan University, an anthology *Dao: Companion to Japanese Confucian Philosophy*. Tucker has published articles and book reviews in scholarly journals such as *Philosophy East & West*, the *Journal of Chinese Philosophy*, *Asian Philosophy*, the *Journal of the Royal Asiatic Society*, *Chinese Culture*, *Sino-Japanese Studies*, *Journal of Japanese Studies*, and *Japan Studies Review*.
