OUTLINES.

Spanish Commissioners agree absolutely to relinquish all claim to sovereignty over Cuba, without term or conditions. The British cabinet has decided to proclaim a British protectorate over Egypt. President McKim reviewed the military parade at the Philadelphia peace jubilee. 83,000 men marched in the procession. Gov. Russell's letter in reply to a communication from citizens of Wilmington in regard to the political situation in New Hanover county, is published under a Washington dispatch. Traffic managers of the associated railroads of Virginia and the Carolinas are in session at Baltimore. Gen. Kitchener on his arrival in London was greeted with an oration from the populace. A desperate fight occurred between whites and five Indians in Oregon; the latter were killed and one white man was fatally wounded. COTTON REGION BULLETIN.

For the twenty-four hours ended at 5 A. M. yesterday: Light showers occurred yesterday in the Atlantic coast district. Clear weather prevailed this morning in all sections, excepting over northern Texas, where it is partly cloudy. The temperature has fallen decidedly from the Mississippi valley to the Atlantic coast, with heavy to killing frosts generally reported. The temperature at Washington is 60, at New York 51, at St. Louis 45.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The weather is generally clear to-night in all reporting districts, excepting over southern Florida, where light showers have occurred during the day and the evening continues cloudy. The storm area which has covered the Middle and North Atlantic coast States last evening has moved rapidly westward and is now off the North Atlantic coast. It has been followed by a high-pressure area, central in West Virginia, accompanied by much lower temperatures in the Middle and North Atlantic coast. The barometer has fallen sharply throughout the Gulf States, Mississippi valley and the extreme Northwest, with higher temperatures and a new focus is central to-night in northern Minnesota. Generally fair weather will prevail Friday in this vicinity, with rising temperature and winds becoming easterly.

HOSPITAL RE-ORGANIZATION.

Dr. Werthebaker Has Appointed Dr. Barwell Assistant Medical Superintendent at the City Hospital. Dr. W. M. Barwell, of Bonaville, Va., has been appointed Assistant Medical Superintendent of the City Hospital. STAR readers will remember that a few weeks ago Dr. Werthebaker, of the Marine Hospital, voluntarily assumed the temporary superintendency of the hospital, gradually in order that he might establish a thorough Marine Hospital system there. The appointment of Dr. Barwell as assistant was made by Dr. Werthebaker and as soon as the new system is well established Dr. Werthebaker will resign from the medical superintendency and Dr. Barwell will assume full control. Dr. Barwell will reside at the hospital and have immediate control of its affairs. Dr. Barwell has had a good deal of experience in hospitals, and at one time was an intern in the United States Marine Hospital at Boston, Mass.

LABORERS' UNION ORGANIZED.

A white laborers' union, with thirty-five members, was organized at the corner of Eighth and Castle streets last night. A committee was appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws, which will be adopted at the next meeting, which is to be called by the temporary chairman possibly next Thursday night. The object of the union is to co-operate with the employers in the city in the matter of securing white men to take the places of negroes who may be discharged from their positions. Mr. M. F. Dowling presided last night as chairman and Mr. M. T. Silva was secretary. Permanent officers will be elected at the next meeting.

A Lively Runaway.

As a result of a runaway on Front street yesterday, Mr. S. Siegler's delivery horse is somewhat crippled and Mrs. Philip Christ's delivery wagon badly broken up. Mr. Siegler's horse became frightened and ran down the street, colliding with the wagon to which he was hitched, with Mrs. Christ's wagon, breaking one wheel and a shaft of the latter. The horse then broke out of the harness and ran some distance down Dock street before he was caught.

Mr. Bellamy's Campaign.

John D. Bellamy, Esq., Democratic candidate for Congress in the Sixth district, arrived in Wilmington yesterday evening, from Pender county. Monday last he spoke at Gram in Christian township, near Point Caswell, Thursday at Currie, Wednesday at Long Creek and yesterday at Rocky Point. Large numbers of white voters attended at all these places, and great interest was manifested. To-day Mr. Bellamy will speak near Burgaw and to-morrow at Shaken.

NEGRO KILLED AT HAMLET.

He Insulted and Assaulted a Well Known White Man Who Wore a Red Shirt.

News was received here yesterday of an incident which occurred in Hamlet Wednesday evening, which is but another illustration of the insolence engendered among negroes by the present Republican-negro regime and which has resulted fatally for the negro who attempted to bulldoze a red shirt.

Mr. Brooks, who is employed on the Carolina Central depot yard at Hamlet, had occasion to enter a business house where several negroes were loafing. They were apparently drinking. Mr. Brooks was wearing a red shirt and one of the negroes stepped forward and demanded to know what he meant by wearing the shirt. He was given to understand that it was none of his business, whereupon he drew a large knife and attempted to assault Mr. Brooks, who drew his revolver and sent a ball crashing through the negro's head, killing him instantly.

It is understood that Mr. Brooks has been completely exonerated by the coroner's jury, in that the killing was clearly in self defence.

This is one of the most compactly organized unions in the city and has done some effective work in the great struggle for white supremacy. Nothing but routine business was before the union last night, but it was a very enthusiastic and full of good feeling.

Mr. Frank H. Mitchell has gone to Bloomfield, New Jersey, to attend the marriage of his son, Mr. Benjamin F. Mitchell to Miss Fannie E. Madison of that city, which, as heretofore announced in the STAR, will be celebrated on Wednesday next week. Mr. Mitchell will spend some time in New York and take a trip up the Hudson river before he returns to Wilmington.

RETURNED FROM RALEIGH.

Committee of Citizens Sent from Wilmington to Confer With Gov. Russell—Nothing Divulged.

Mr. James Sprunt, Mr. J. H. Chadler, Mr. E. K. Bryan, Esq., and Rev. Peyton H. Hoge returned yesterday from Raleigh, where they went to confer with Governor Russell in regard to the political situation here, and urge that the Republicans put out no ticket, either county or Legislative, and that in view of the present bitter feeling between the races the appointment for Senator Pritchard and O. H. Dockery to speak here be called in.

While all four gentlemen declined to make any statement in regard to the result of their conference with the Governor, the STAR reporter was given to understand that they were very well pleased.

The fact of their conference with the Governor Wednesday afternoon and their return to Raleigh yesterday were published in the Raleigh correspondence yesterday. A STAR reporter was told last night that the committee had made a report of their trip to certain committees here and it would probably be made public Saturday.

Russell and his gang seem to be thoroughly muddled and scarcely know their own minds. It will be seen from the STAR's telegraphic dispatches this morning that Governor Russell has issued a letter in which he says that the Republicans of New Hanover propose to run Mr. B. F. Keith for the Senate and Mr. D. L. Gore and Capt. R. B. Davis for the House.

STAR readers will remember that Mr. Keith has a case on yesterday's paper declaring that he has withdrawn entirely from politics and will not run for or accept any office. A report called on Mr. D. L. Gore last night and told that the STAR could announce authoritatively that Mr. Gore will not be a candidate for the House and would not accept office if elected by any party.

Wilmington Will Be Well Represented at the Rally To-day—The Band and Others Left Last Night.

Quite a crowd of Wilmingtonians left on the 7:15 Coast Line train last night for Goldsboro to be in attendance upon the great Democratic rally there to-day. Many more will go on the 8 o'clock special this morning. So that there is every assurance that this city will be among the best represented in all the State.

Daniel Ellis, colored, an ex-convict, who has no doubt been induced by his party leaders to register, was arrested yesterday and carried before Justice McGowan, who placed him under a \$50 bond for his appearance Monday to answer the charge of perjury, preferred by Mr. Geo. W. Mills, the registrar. This should serve as a reminder to all ex-convicts that they will be severely dealt with if they swear falsely to have their names put on the registration books.

Before Squire Bornemann, James Smith, one of the Wilmington policemen, will be tried for disorderly conduct, in that he was cursing loudly and profanely in the vicinity of the Fifth Ward a few nights since. Besides these cases there are also a number of minor offences, which are to be answered for to-day by various other disturbers of the peace.

Spirits turpentine was quoted on the Wilmington market yesterday at 25¢ and 26¢, with the tone of the market firm. There was no change in cotton, except the tone, which was steady at the closing.
