

## **Listen, Watch and Wonder**

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I've recently come back from a three-months trip to Poland, Spain and Israel, followed by a trip to New Zealand.

In all these places, I have encountered 'the world after covid' among Suzuki families and friends.

It is a different world, beyond any doubt. This pandemic has changed the world. It has created a stir in human psyche. People everywhere act and behave differently. The ramifications of the pandemic, the war in Ukraine, climate disasters and more are partially known to us and more is being revealed as we go forward.

In these changing times, we need to ask ourselves:

- What are the things that are beyond fad?
- What are the values that humanity could not survive without?
- What is in the core of being human?

In the words of Rumi, the thirteenth-century Persian poet and scholar:

*"Love is the vital core of the soul.  
And of all you see, only love is infinite."*

Children and adults alike cannot live without love. The need to love and be loved is existential.

In Suzuki's words:

*"Where love is deep much can be accomplished."*

Children love to learn; this too is an existential need. To survive we need to learn.

The Talent Education movement advocates developing the whole child THROUGH music.

As Suzuki once said:

*"Teaching music is not my main purpose.  
I want to make good citizens, noble human beings.  
If a child hears fine music from the day of his birth, and learns to play it himself,  
he develops sensitivity, discipline and endurance. He gets a beautiful heart."*

When I look into the eyes of a child, I see a world waiting to be discovered. I hope we make sure we do not destroy this pure desire of children to learn and grow.

The spark in the eyes of a child, the desire to learn, is there from the beginning. We have to nurture it with love and care.

Like the seed in the earth, we don’t know what the future holds for our children. We can dream for them and with them. We can wish and hope. And

the best tools we can give them is love and nurture. All of us feel loved when we are seen and listened to.

Just come to it as “let's make music together.” And your contribution might “just” be sitting there with your child with your full presence and love not demanding anything, just appreciating the fact that they make music, that you two make music. Whether it is just a moment or two – it is still valuable. You are putting the seed into the ground and you know that it will grow into the most beautiful flower, a unique one that no other will be exactly the same.

Nourish it. Love it. Listen to it. See it. AND WONDER.

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
